Airway and Airway Management Workshop

Marc SAVARD

We all know Airway is the first of the ABC's but did you know it can be one of the most overlooked/bypassed interventions in EMS? We've all quickly opened the airway to ventilate the non-breathing person but what about the breathing patient? We quickly get distracted with other issues and the airway quickly becomes forgotten. This session will provide EMS providers an opportunity to review common mistakes with airway management and corrective strategies to address them. With a lot of hands on opportunities for BLS interventions and ALS techniques, the participant will gain in knowledge, confidence, and ability to protect their patient's airway.



Self Defense Workshop
Sensei Kim MARSHALL

Learn how to defend yourself, should the need arise! Both the theoretical and practical aspects of personal security and self defense will be covered as part of the curriculum:

- Introduction & explanation of the workshop objectives.
- Physical and psychological reactions to stress (flight or fight syndrome).
- Personal security awareness tool – “Five Color Code System”
- Using your environment to your advantage,” an interactive discussion of awareness tactics to enhance overall personal security.
- Basic self-defensive techniques including: stances, body shifting, dynamics of blocking, as well as striking, kicking, control tactics and escape.
- Pressure point tactics that can be used to disable or disarm an attacker.
- Scenario based training to counter attacks from the front, attacks from the rear, choke holds, grabs, hair-pulls, etc.
- Defense against wall and ground attacks; multiple person attacks; and weapons attacks.

Although the program content is extensive, it may not cover all interests relating to personal security and self defense. Should other topics of interest arise we will, time permitting, endeavor to address additional content. It is important to note that this is an interactive and physical workshop.

Building Workforce Resiliency within Workplaces is designed to assist organizations in meeting the short and long term psychosocial needs of workers responding to a disaster. Experience in disaster management has shown that health, emergency and public safety workers may experience high levels of stress as a result of their role in responding to a disaster. Increased stress affects individual workers, their families and the organizations where they work. When these pressures continue over a period of time, they can reduce an individual's ability to perform assigned duties and may have long-term effects.

Although it is impossible to prepare for every potential scenario, pre-event planning and, if necessary, mid-event adaptation of plans are essential to the success of workforce resiliency. In fact, the process of planning for an emergency is at least as important if not more important than the plan it produces. Effective crisis response capacity depends on the development of collaborative and trusting relationships and on the contributions of workers themselves into the development of plans.
